Resilience and Resolve

I was listening to Peter Round, the head of Khartoum International Community School, speak last Thursday explaining to heads of school around the world how he was sheltering both members of his school community and others on campus while fighting rages in the city. I also have a dear friend who is head of Khartoum American School and has been evacuated to a UN sanctuary hotel as her school is near the epicenter of the conflict. And, as difficult as their plight may be, they are luckier than many in Khartoum at this time.

In his briefing, Peter spoke of the importance of resilience and resolve at a time such as this which brings me to my quote for this week, "Enthusiasm is common. Endurance is rare." If you think about those who are successful in school, but—more importantly—successful in life, a notable factor is resilience and endurance. We all know that life is going to have its difficult moments—some very difficult indeed—but the successful people find a way to bounce back, endure, and succeed despite the challenges, disappointments, and failures.

How can we encourage resilience in our children and in our students? Set high expectations and don't make it too easy; at the same time, let them know that they are loved and cared for, and that failure is necessary to achieve success. Whenever we try something really hard, we will have failures along the way, but we pick ourselves up and try again. So, let us allow our children to do for themselves and let them attempt things that are hard in the knowledge that we are there to help them pick themselves up and try, try, try again.

And, at this time, let us send our good thoughts and prayers to all those suffering in Khartoum and in conflict zones around the world.

High School


