
Grade 5-8 (English and Social Studies)

This week in ELA the grade 5/6 class was introduced to the concept of simple, compound, and complex sentences. They also continued to read through this trimester's novel, *The Land of Stories: The Wishing Spell.* In addition, they began preparing for the upcoming chapter by learning a variety of new vocabulary words. While in social studies they put on their archeologist hats and investigated various artifacts from around the world. In grade 7/8 students continued reading through their novel, *Summer of the Mariposas*, both as a class and in small groups. They looked at different literary devices, including similes, metaphors, alliteration, and the novel's symbolism. While in social studies students began working in groups to narrow down the events in Ancient Greece's timeline from 50 to 10, with the final goal of constructing a concise, organized, and visually appealing presentation on poster board.













Grade 5-8 (math and science)

This week in science, grades 5 and 6 presented their periodic tables to the class and began learning about molecules. Grades 7 and 8 learned about physical and behavioral adaptations of animals. In Math, grade 5 completed their lesson on using the volume formula. Grade 6 completed their lesson on finding the area of triangles and other polygons. Grade 7 began a lesson on finding unit rates and grade 8 completed their lesson on single rigid transformations in the coordinate plane.

In addition to all of the academics, the students really enjoyed spirit week. Most everyone participated, thank you parents for all of your assistance in finding costumes!

French class in middle school began very well this school year. We saw lots of faces we know very well and were happy to meet some new ones. To begin properly we did an introduction activity by making *un acrostiche*. We had to find French words starting with each of the letters of our names to describe ourselves.

To understand why we even make the effort of learning a new language, we discovered the many places on earth where French is spoken. What an advantage in this world to master French! Also very useful, before continuing with the lessons, are the instructions in French that we will use regularly in class. We practiced them in pairs and by playing charades.

And then it was time for the real thing. Grade 5 begins working in Français Plus 2 and Grade 6 will start the year by closing of the last chapters of this book. Grades 6, 7 and 8 were first asked to dig up what they remember of the previous years. Grades 7 and 8 will start by completing Français Plus 3. This year the francophone students will work in a

separate group, using Arc-en-Ciel 4 with some more time for specific explanations and attention to the oral aspect of the language learning.
