Our week started with a wonderful visit from Alim Kamara - a great storyteller and performer.

He taught us about the importance of Black History Month and engaged us in some interactive songs and stories.

In Science we learnt about animal diets, carnivores, herbivores and omnivores.

In ELA we learnt about nouns and adjectives. We learnt about the story of a brave little girl called Ruby Bridges. Who despite all odds, was the first African American to integrate an all-white school. We came up with lots of adjectives to describe this brave little girl.

















#### Grade 1-2

Meanwhile, we honed our fine motor skills through handwriting practice and sharpened our comprehension abilities through engaging reading activities. ### Grade 3-4

We kicked off Black History Month with a session led by Alim Kamara, who welcomed us with songs and storytelling. In class, we've been learning about brave African Americans who fought for freedom and remained positive in the face of challenges. This month will be full of new learning experiences as we explore Black History.

We've also started a bullying awareness program in our class. We've been learning about bullying and how to be a buddy, not a bully.

In Agricultural Science, we're learning about animals and have started rearing chickens in our garden. We researched online how to care for them and learned some interesting facts. We also planted watermelon and cucumber seeds."





# **Grade 5-8 (English and Social Studies)**

This week in ELA the grade 5/6 class read the *Land of Stories* and practised reading with emphasis on italicized words. Students also worked on their personalized iReady lessons. In social studies we started building models of the Mayan pyramids. While in 7/8 we continued reading the *Coddling of the American Mind,* in addition to working through some personalized iReady lessons. In social studies, after some research, students presented on various conflicts currently taking place around the globe.



## **Grade 5-8 (Math and Science)**

This week in middle school Math, grade 5 completed their lesson on adding fractions with unlike denominators. Grade 6 completed their lesson on dividing fractions. Grade 7 completed their lesson on dividing rational numbers and grade 8 continued leading about slope intercept form.

Grades 5 and 6 wrapped up their lesson on waves with a trip to Tokeh Sands where they measured wave frequency, amplitude and wavelength. Grades 7 and 8 took a test on the skeletal and muscular systems.







# **High School**

Several visits this week. On Monday, to mark the start of Black History Month, Mr. Alim Kamara, from London, visited us. On Tuesday, the grade 12 students came to greet the students of our school and played a game of basketball. Victory for AISF.











### **French (Middle School)**

Grade 5 created their own house to learn all the words they need to describe it. Another vocabulary theme was clothing. In grammar we studied the difference between masculine and feminine nouns and how the adjective must agree in gender (later follows number) with its noun. We revised the colors and learned the conjugation of the verbs ending on - er. And when the students are asked *Quelle heure est-il?*, they know how to answer.

Grade 6 read a text about crossing the street and learned vocabulary that has to do with food. In grammar we worked on the plural of nouns and some of its exceptions and on the conjugation of the new verb, *voir*. The last grammar lesson in the book Grade 6 started last school year, *Français Plus 2*, was all about the *passé composé* with *avoir*. The students can now talk about present, future and past! And they are completely ready to start a new challenge.

In our word-of-the-day section the question was asked: *Est-ce que vous parlez ...?* Answers only in French!
